

VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT

We recently sat down with Erin Pierson, a dedicated Steep Rock volunteer who exemplifies the transformative power of volunteering and the lasting impact it can have on future generations.

What inspired your involvement with Steep Rock? When we moved to Washington, we thought it was really important to get involved volunteering. So immediately I started looking for volunteer opportunities. I grew up hiking so getting involved with trails and wilderness preservation at Steep Rock was a great fit for us.

Share your projects with us: My first trail party was a just under a year ago. I've worked on a couple of different projects at Steep Rock from helping to plan Judea Garden's 15th Season anniversary events, to the Midwinter Bald Eagle Count with my husband on a

freezing cold day. It's been a great first year! Steep Rock is such a special organization in that it has multiple angles to what it does. It provides everything from wilderness preservation to outdoor access, to education, to the food donations available to neighbors in need through Judea Garden.

What are some unforgettable moments for you? Steep Rock has done a fantastic job building a community. A special moment at Steep Rock that stands out for me was at the bonfire party for the spring equinox. What a great way for volunteers to get to know each other, meet the staff, and celebrate the changing of the seasons. Having opportunities to socialize with great people and reflect on Washington's magnificent landscape and the changing seasons was a really wonderful experience for us.

What inspires your commitment to our work? I remember growing up near Westchester and hiking the same trails that my dad hiked as a child. When we take care of trails, they'll last for generations. So the idea that I can work on or help preserve a Steep Rock trail that potentially my grandchildren could hike is the definition of community involvement and stewardship and preservation to me.

HIDDEN VALLEY EXPANDS 25%

Behind The Scenes on Land Acquisitions

Steep Rock is thrilled to announce the purchase of 206 acres of critically important conservation land, marking a significant milestone for our Hidden Valley Expansion. Situated between Hidden Valley Preserve and Mt. Tom State Park, the four parcels (Cook, Mt. Tom, Bantam, and Asrar) boast a diverse range of unique and vital wildlife habitats, rare species, and breathtaking views along the Shepaug and Bantam Rivers. The expansion provides new opportunities for passive recreation, welcoming hikers, cyclists, and equestrians.

Yet, the true essence of this accomplishment lies in the decades of relentless dedication, planning, outreach, fundraising, grant writing, and other essential efforts invested to secure these parcels. Approximately 17 years ago, the

Steep Rock Board embarked on the mission to identify and acquire high-priority conservation areas in Washington. The Cook parcel was immediately recognized as a top priority if it ever became available. In 2018, the Steep Rock Board established a comprehensive set of criteria to quide our decision-making process for land acquisitions. The Cook parcel was formally designated as one of the three strategic priorities. When the opportunity arose in 2020, Trustees and Staff worked closely to shape the initial round of grant applications.

However, the path to acquiring these parcels has been marked by an arduous journey spanning the past three years. We encountered numerous delays and unforeseen obstacles, many of which were beyond the control of SRA. These challenges included the disruptive impact of the Covid-19 pandemic, contractual setbacks, administrative and legal postponements, prolonged grant review periods, and more. Undeterred, we remained resolute in our determination to see this project through.

During the final stages of awaiting grant approval, we identified a potential funding shortfall. Gratefully, an SRA Trustee extended a generous \$100,000 Match Challenge, which garnered support from over 100 people. The Challenge exceeded our goal, raising \$267,234 including the Match. In total, SRA successfully raised over \$2.9 million, which includes nearly \$2.2 million in grant funds and almost \$750,000 in private donations. This achievement represents our most triumphant acquisition to date.

EVOLUTION OF A TRAIL

Uniting Hands to Craft a Hiking Haven. Behind the Scenes at Hillside Farm

In April, volunteers from Steep Rock embarked on an exciting project: constructing a new half-mile trail at Hillside Farm, the latest addition to West Mountain Preserve. Creating a sturdy hiking trail requires a long-term commitment, attention to many details, and a team effort. Let's delve into the process and understand what it takes to build a trail that is both enjoyable and sustainable.

The journey begins with meticulous mapping and planning. Before any construction begins, staff must carefully assess the terrain, taking into account factors such as slope, vegetation, wetlands and streams, and other natural features. This crucial step ensures that the trail is designed to harmonize with the environment, providing hikers with an immersive experience while reducing negative impacts on the surrounding natural area.

Proper permitting is another crucial aspect of trail building. Securing necessary permits ensures compliance with regulations and that the trail has minimum impact on the environment.

Once planning and permitting are in place, the real work begins. Staff and volunteers invest dozens of hours of manual labor to bring the trail to life. At Hillside Farm, the dedicated team started by mowing a path through the fields. They meticulously cut and filled uneven areas to create a smooth and safe path for hikers. To conquer challenging terrain, such as wetlands or marshy areas, the team will build bog bridges and a boardwalk, allowing visitors to traverse these sections without disturbing the delicate wetlands.

The initial phase of the project saw the combined efforts of ten hardworking volunteers who devoted 25 hours of work. However, the trail is under construction with the bog bridging and boardwalk yet to be finished. The goal is to have the entire trail ready for public access this summer.

Creating sustainable hiking trails that will last for years is not a one-time effort; regular upkeep is necessary to ensure its longevity and enjoyment. Continuous mowing of the paths is essential to keep the trail well-maintained and accessible to hikers year-round.

On the third Saturday of every month, Steep Rock hosts a "Work Party" where volunteers engage in a variety of projects, from building

trails, to removing invasive species, to creating trail amenities that enhance the hiker experience. No experience necessary to volunteer for our monthly Work Party. Whatever the work may be, the goal remains the same: stewardship of our beautiful preserves.



"A WAY OF LIFE"

Legends & Legacies

We recently had the privilege of conversing with long-time Washington resident John A. Herrmann, Jr. With a remarkable tenure as a Trustee, John has been an integral part of our land trust since 1985. His dedication and exceptional leadership skills have seen him assume various pivotal roles within the organization. John's journey at Steep Rock commenced as a Trustee. Recognizing his leadership talents, he was appointed as VP, serving from 1999 to 2006 then Chairman from 2008 to 2014. He remains on our Board of Trustees.

What's your Steep Rock origin story? I got involved in 1985 after having met George Ward and playing golf with him. He co-opted me for the board. My wife Anne and I had been in Washington for a year. We came here because we thought it was a quiet place to be, and we love the wooded land-scapes.

Describe Steep Rock through your eyes: After you've been involved with Steep Rock long enough it becomes a way of life. It is walking the trails, helping protect and steward the land, helping others learn about conservation. That goes way back to Steep Rock's founding, why Ehrick Rossiter donated the land to the community. I've met wonderful people because of my association with Steep Rock.



If you care deeply about something, if you treasure it and wish to take care of it for future generations, there's no better way to do it than to leave money to the organization in your will.

What drives your stewardship gifts to Steep Rock? I have gotten a lot of satisfaction out of what we've built since I got involved. Hidden Valley has expanded, we acquired West Mountain and Macricostas Preserves. There are so many more beautiful trails. But once you acquire land, you have to take care of it. Year after year. Stewarding land is vital and requires more resources than some people may realize. My gifts have largely been to support stewardship at Steep Rock.

What inspired you to leave a legacy gift in your will to Steep Rock? It comes down to this: if you care deeply about something, if you treasure it and wish to take care of it for future generations, there's no better way to do it than to leave money to the organization in your will. It's simple to do. You can leave a gift in your will, trust or financial account. Speak with an attorney or financial advisor for guidance. It's sad that you won't be around to see what it's used for, but a planned gift in your will can be extraordinarily important to a land trust. I've tried to do that without any restrictions on the gift that I made. I don't want my name on a barn. I don't want my name on a trail. I don't want my name on a bench. I just want to be sure Steep Rock survives for future generations. This place is extraordinarily special.

THE PRESERVE DOCTOR IS IN!

Behind the Scenes at How Steep Rock Studies Stream and Forest Health

Since our founding nearly a century ago, SRA's primary objective has been to steward our preserves for healthy wildlife habitat and passive recreation.

Like an annual checkup at the doctor's office, each year we survey conditions in our preserves, identify threats, and develop plans to promote ecological health. Our natural areas tell us about their overall state through the research we conduct, which is critical given the ever-increasing threats from the climate crisis. Data analysis then helps us determine management strategies to treat symptoms and improve vitality.

This summer, we're monitoring SRA's Hidden Valley Preserve – a 900+ acre expanse of cascading

watercourses, lush meadows, and forests young and old in the heart of Washington. Among Hidden Valley's many critical habitats – rare and specialized places essential to conserving imperiled wildlife – are tributary streams flowing into the Shepaug River.

SRA staff and interns will be investigating water temperatures in Bee Brook and Mallory Brook. By analyzing average, maximum, and seasonally fluctuating stream temperatures, we can determine their ability to support sensitive organisms like brook trout as well as their vulnerability to habitat degradation from warming temperatures.

We will also be studying the streams' channels and surrounding area, measuring streambank dimensions, vegetation, and shade as well as potential impairments (e.g., erosion, barriers, lack of buffers, etc.). Taking a comprehensive look at streams provides a thorough understanding of current conditions and enables SRA to prioritize actions and assess the effectiveness of habitat improvement strategies. For example, a lack of in-stream fish cover may be improved by adding large woody material, canopy cover can cool water temperatures, stabilized banks reduce the eroding forces of floods, and removing culverts helps aquatic organisms safely seek refuge.

Switching our preserve diagnosis to forests, one of the coolest microclimates in Hidden Vallev Preserve is a narrow tract of forest classified as Rich Hemlock-Northern Hardwood Seepage Forest. This forest type is unique and uncommon in this part of Connecticut. The combination of slope direction, groundwater seepage, shade, and rock-laden slope have created conditions for northern-loving plants found nowhere else in our preserves. It also makes these forests vulnerable to changes in temperature and precipitation.

This area will serve as SRA's second forest monitoring plot, in addition to one set up in Macricostas Preserve in 2022. Our research entails various measurements of trees and vegetation. Only through repetitious monitoring and data collection will we be able to determine the impact of a changing climate on our forest ecosystems and what we can do to help maintain forest health.

Like a medical doctor, Steep Rock is monitoring the health of our preserves, diagnosing symptoms, and attempting to steward the long-term wellness of our forests, fields, and waterways so that our wildlife and our visitors can thrive in nature for generations.

While the process of acquiring land for conservation typically does not span 17 years, it does begin with a visionary outlook and demands an unwavering commitment, patience, perseverance, coordination, and collaboration. Through these virtues, we have successfully safeguarded these precious 206 acres for perpetuity.

PRESERVING HISTORY

River's Edge Trail (a.k.a "Goat Trail")

The River's Edge Trail, originally constructed as a horse trail in 1931, holds a significant place in SRA history and is a beloved destination for hikers. As an integral part of Steep Rock Preserve, this trail offers breathtaking views of the Shepaug River and takes you through a majestic hemlock forest, providing an unforgettable experience.

Time, the trail's popularity, and natural elements, however, have taken a toll on its condition. Years of foot traffic, storm damage, and erosion have left the trail in urgent need of repair. That's why we developed a comprehensive rehabilitation plan to restore 14 key locations along 1,742 feet of riverbank trail. By installing essential features like crib walls (erosion control), stone steps, copping stones,

and enhancing the existing trail, we will ensure its stability and durability, improve hiker safety, and reduce long-term maintenance efforts.

Given the trail's challenging terrain, using mechanized equipment is not feasible. Instead, we will employ traditional methods, quarrying stones onsite and shaping them with hand tools. Leading the project is Tahawus Trails LLC, who worked collaboratively with SRA to construct the highly popular Boulders Trail in Macricostas Preserve last year. Progress will be documented through video footage and serve as valuable training material for our volunteers.

We're halfway to our \$71,000 goal to fund this important project. To complete work this summer, we need the help of generous donors
