#### Steep Rock Preserve: Tunnel Road Bridge Closed Until Further Notice

The Town of Washington is replacing Tunnel Road Bridge over the Shepaug River. There is **no parking or access to Steep Rock Preserve coming from River Road or Lower Church Hill Road**. The only vehicle access is Spring Hill Road off Route 199/Roxbury Road. **Horse trailers are prohibited until the bridge has reopened**.
